"CAN WE BALANCE NATURE?" *DISEASE IN WILD BIRDS: PRECAUTION AND PREVENTION Monday March 18th at 7:00pm

- What do you do if you spot a sick bird or, worse yet, multiple sick or dying birds?
- Where do all the pigeons (rock doves), crows and Canada geese come from?

Our speaker Jennifer Ramsey is a highly-regarded wildlife veterinarian who works with Montana Fish, Wildlife and Parks. Dr. Ramsey's job includes necropsy on wild animal carcasses, looking for possible disease outbreaks, among other things, that can be checked before they get out of hand. She will talk about common diseases and issues affecting the health of wild birds in Montana. Backyard feeders and citizen scientists can serve as an early warning system for problems in nature. If a disease does occur in your yard, what are your responsibilities as a bird lover? People who feed or attract many birds need to be especially careful about feeder cleaning during disease outbreaks.

Billings, along with many Montana cities and towns from Miles City to Butte, is facing the issues that come with large congregations of pigeons, crows and Canada geese. Joining Dr. Ramsey will be Stella Capoccia, professor of biology from Montana Tech of the University of Montana, who is involved with the City of Butte's pigeon (rock dove) control plan. She will discuss how the disease vector relates to this project. The rock dove is dependent on humans for success because they are poor nest builders. Thus, experts hope to control the birds by focusing on their nesting and foraging habits.

*<u>Disease in wild birds is called ZOONOSIS:</u> A zoonotic disease or zoonosis is an infection or infestation shared in nature by humans and other animals.

While savoring all the good food, we enjoyed birding out the picture window which featured Northern Flicker, House Sparrow, House Finch, and Black-capped Chickadee - plus one wayward squirrel who tried to steal the show.

A new stop for this field trip was Zimmerman Park, where everyone was thrilled to see cross bills!!! We saw Red Crossbill, White-breasted Nuthatch, American Robin, Downy Woodpecker and Black-billed Magpie. Zimmerman Park is a delight because you can look out over the rims and see the birds almost at eye level.

Deb and Steve Regele then hosted the group at their delightful home near Joliet. We saw oodles of Black-capped Chickadee, Downy Woodpecker, Black-eyed Junco,

American Robin, lots of Cedar Waxwings, and House Finch. Deb treated us to delicious homemade cookies and gave us quick education on raising mealie worms and mason bees, while Steve and others were almost tempted to try out the pulley bridge across the creek. RIVERS AND WILDLIFE CELEBRATION SANDHILL CRANE FESTIVAL

KEARNEY, NEBRASKA

Organized by Audubon Nebraska, the annual festival brings together nature enthusiasts from across the country to witness the migration of over half a million sandhill cranes and millions of waterfowl and other birds through central Nebraska. Events include guided field trips to local birding hotspots; the Wild Experience Room with live raptor and reptile presentations on Saturday; and daily visits to river blinds operated by Audubon's Rowe Sanctuary for up-close views of cranes roosting on the Platte River. JUNE 7-9 14TH ANNUAL WINGS ACROSS THE BIG SKY FESTIVAL LEWISTOWN, MONTANA

You are invited to join Montana Audubon and Lewistown for dynamic birding field trips, great speakers, interesting presentations, and fun festivities as we celebrate efforts to conserve our birds and wildlife in the heart of Montana. One of only ten cities nationwide selected to receive an Urban Conservation Treaty for Migratory Birds grant, the Lewistown community and surrounding areas are gearing up to welcome birders to the region.

"The Urban Bird Treaty program, administered by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, brings together private citizens, as well as federal, state, and municipal agencies and non-governmental organizations to conserve migratory birds through education programs, participation in citizen science, conservation and habitat improvement strategies, and reduction of hazards to birds in urban/suburban areas."

Keynote speaker Susan Bonfield of the International Migratory Bird Day and Environment for the Americas will share with us a glimpse into the Western Hummingbird Partnership and the world of hummingbirds. 


