## **REPORT FROM THE MONTANA LEGISLATURE**



A very sincere THANK YOU FROM THE MONTANA SPORTSMEN ALLIANCE......

This has been a difficult legislative session, one that has considered numerous bills affecting sporting organizations and various birding groups. In the past there have been complaints that groups only testify on very narrow subject matter that specifically concerns them. **The Montana Sportsman Alliance** considers birders a critical part of the outdoor sports fraternity, and Montana Audubon has been there with us.

In this session there have been bills proposed to "micromanage" FWP, to remove or constrain commission authority, and to mandate game management without science based objectives and discussion. Just as important, there even have been attacks on the North American Model protecting the Public Trust and on Fair Chase, and several bills have been introduced increasing permit and license fees for non-residents at the expense of state of Montana resident sportsmen/women. Once again there have been many bills which negatively affect conservation land management and reduce Montana's efforts to increase habitat and access for all wildlife--including birds. Other bills negatively impact the ability and, more important if the species is to survive, the need to transplant bighorn sheep. The Montana Sportsmen Alliance would like to thank Montana Audubon, including YVAS Audubon Chapter, Billings, for their due diligence on legislative issues this session. You have been there on issues affecting your members and ours. We understand and respect your choice to remain on the sidelines on some issues, but we really appreciate your help on issues common to the Montana resident sportsmen/women. Your foresight and dependability are well known by our members, and we thank Janet Ellis and Justin Sakalis of Montana Audubon, for their work on our behalf and that of all Montanans.

# FIELD TRIP NOTES

# SATURDAY APRIL 13 EXXON PONDS

A group of 22 birders including YVAS members, several Rocky Mountain College students, an eleven year-

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old beginning birder, and Mr. Ron Kuhler of Exxon, spent the morning of April 13, 2013 at the Exxon Ponds and adjacent Yellowstone River area. The weather was pretty typical of an April day in Montana, a little chilly, a little overcast, but pretty nice all in all.

We saw about 30 species of birds at the Exxon ponds area, and enjoyed some good conversations about birds, environments, and the world in general. Birds recorded included: Northern Shoveler, Canada Goose, Eurasian Collared-Dove, European Starling, Rock Pigeon, Red-winged Blackbird, Ring-necked Pheasant, Mallard, American Wigeon, American Coot, Song Sparrow, Black-capped Chickadee, Bufflehead, Common Merganser, Bald Eagle (on a nest along the river), Ring-billed Gull, Western Meadowlark, Common Flicker, Great Blue Heron and Sandhill Crane (flying by), Red-breasted Merganser, Green-winged Teal, Lesser Scaup, an Owl (likely a Great Horned Owl), Belted Kingfisher, Black-billed Magpie, and a Wood Duck flushing from the heavy undergrowth along one of the ponds. Thanks Ron and Exxon for opening up the Exxon area for a nice morning of wandering around looking at some April birds!

Some of the group continued on to the Emerald Hills area after leaving the Exxon Ponds. On the way they had a great look at a pair of Sandhill Cranes in a field. On top of Emerald Hills they saw many Mountain Bluebirds and several Red Crossbills. On the way down they encountered a Raven and were pleased to get off the dirt roads before a strong rain squall hit them. Thank you to Steve Regele

# NOTICE OF YVAS BYLAWS CHANGES

The Bylaws of the Yellowstone Valley Audubon Society have been reviewed by the Board of Directors in an attempt to update and clarify selected sections. The following changes that appear in **bold**, *italicized* print are amendments proposed to be added by the Board. Items proposed to be eliminated are printed in gray ink. A complete copy of the current Bylaws is accessible on the website, yvaudubon.org. Copies will also be available at the May 20th membership meeting. If you wish a personal copy of the Bylaws, please send a self-addressed stamped envelope to YVAS, P.O. Box 30324, Billing, MT 59107. Members will be asked to vote on these amendments at the May 20, 2013 meeting.

#### Proposed Amendments May 20, 2013

We, Citizens of the State of Montana, associate ourselves together **as a nonprofit corporation** for the purpose of educating members of our community, regardless of sex, race, creed, color, or national origin, in natural history and the environment, and to otherwise engage in such scientific and charitable pursuits that are consistent with the stated purpose.

Mission Statement: Building on the tradition of special interest in birds, the Yellowstone Valley Audubon Society is organized to promote enjoyment and protection of natural environment through education, activism, and conservation of bird habitat.

#### Article I: Name:

Section 2. The name "Audubon" is owned by the National Audubon Society, a nonprofit Corporation of the State of New York, and is used with express permission.

#### Article II: Membership:

Section 1. Any person interested in the purpose of the Yellowstone Valley Audubon Society may become a member, regardless of sex, race, creed, color, or national origin.

- Section 2. Types of membership shall be the same as those maintained by the National Audubon Society, namely: Individual, Student, Family, Sustaining, Supporting, Contributing, Donor, Patron, and Life. In addition, a Supporting Chapter Membership is available to all members who wish to help pay the costs of Yellowstone Valley Audubon Society chapter membership.
- Section 3. Each National Audubon Society member shall enjoy the rights and privileges of members of the National Audubon Society and the Yellowstone Valley Audubon Society. Each Supporting Chapter member shall enjoy only the rights and privileges of members of the Yellowstone Valley Audubon Society.
- Section 4. Annual dues of members shall be the same as those of the National Audubon Society and payable directly to the National Audubon Society, which shall then remit to the Yellowstone Valley Audubon Society its portion of the

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annual dues. Annual dues of members who join through the National Audubon Society are paid directly to the National Audubon Society after the first year of membership when dues are paid through the Yellowstone Valley Audubon Society. Supporting Chapter members pay their annual dues directly to the Yellowstone Valley Audubon Society.

Section 5. Membership dues shall be payable at the time of application and shall be effective from the date of election and yearly thereafter, except in the case of Life members. Dues of Life members shall be paid in full in one sum at the time of application and shall be accepted as of the time of election.

Section 6. Should renewal of membership dues not be paid within the time allowed for renewal by the National Audubon Society (six months) or the Yellowstone Valley Audubon Society (two months) after due date, a member so in default shall forthwith be dropped from the rolls

Section 1. Any person interested in the purpose of the Yellowstone Valley Audubon Society may become a member.

Section 2. A Supporting Yellowstone Valley Audubon Society Chapter Membership is available to all persons who wish to participate in and support the Yellowstone Valley Audubon Society, its mission, projects, and overall membership.

Section 3. Supporting Yellowstone Valley Audubon Society Chapter Members pay their annual dues directly to the Yellowstone Valley Audubon Society and have no membership obligations to National Audubon Society.

Section 4. Each Supporting Yellowstone Valley Audubon Society Chapter Member shall enjoy the rights and privileges of the Yellowstone Valley Audubon Society.

Section 5. Supporting Yellowstone Valley Audubon Society Chapter Membership dues shall be payable at the time of application and shall be effective for one year from the date of subscription and may be renewed annually.

Section 6. Should renewal of Yellowstone Valley Audubon Society Chapter Membership dues not be paid within the time allowed for renewal (two months after the due date), a Member so in default shall forthwith be dropped from the rolls by Yellowstone Valley Audubon Society.

Section 7. A National Audubon Society Membership is available through Yellowstone Valley Audubon Society to those persons joining National Audubon Society for the first time and residing in areas of Montana mutually agreed upon by National Audubon Society and the Yellowstone Valley Audubon Society.

Section 8. The first year dues for a National Audubon Society Member recruited by the Yellowstone Valley Audubon Society are sent to the National Audubon Society by Yellowstone Valley Audubon Society. The first year dues are then returned by National Audubon Society to the Yellowstone Valley Society for the recruitment. Thereafter, all National Audubon Society Members' renewal dues are paid directly to National Audubon Society by the National Audubon Society Member.

Section 9. Each National Audubon Society Member shall enjoy the rights and privileges of Members of the National Audubon Society and a courtesy membership in Yellowstone Audubon Society for those National Audubon Society Members residing in areas noted in Section 7.

#### Article III: National Affiliations

- Section 1. Yellowstone Valley Audubon Society is an independent, not for profit (501 C3) corporation, governed by its Membership and their elected Officers and Board of Directors. The Yellowstone Valley Audubon Society, each year, shall obtain its renewal of National Audubon agreements noted under Article I, Section 2, and Article II chapter charter from the National Audubon Society. and shall comply with the affiliate agreement of the National Audubon Society. All activities undertaken by the Yellowstone Valley Audubon Society shall comply with the stated purpose and Mission of the Yellowstone Valley Audubon Society. National Audubon Society.
- Section 2. Representation of the Yellowstone Valley Audubon Society shall **must** be **pre**-approved by the Board of Directors **prior to any member representing Yellowstone Valley Audubon Society for** at State, Regional, and National Audubon Society meetings, conferences, workshops, conventions and other such gatherings. convened for the purpose of assisting the local or national bodies.
- Section 4. Other affiliations may be approved by the Board of Directors in accordance with Article IX, Section 1, and shall be amended into Article III. Temporary agreements to partner with or support individuals or

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groups, consistent with the stated purpose of the Yellowstone Valley Audubon Society, may be approved by the Board of Directors in accordance with Article XII. Notice of these agreements must be in writing and shared with the membership in accordance with Article VI.

Other affiliations may be approved by the Board of Directors in accordance with Article IX, Section 1, and shall be amended into Article III. Temporary agreements to partner with, or support, individuals or groups consistent with the stated purpose of the Yellowstone Valley Audubon Society, may be approved by the Board of Directors in accordance with Article XII. Notice of these agreements must be in writing and shared with the membership in accordance with Article VI.

#### Section 5. No other affiliations are implied.

#### Article VI: Notices:

Section 1. Except in cases of *urgent or compelling need*, emergency, notices of all meetings of Members and of the Board of Directors shall be in writing and sent through the United States mail or by email to each Member and each Member of the Board of Directors at his latest address as recorded on the books of the Yellowstone Valley Audubon Society, or as otherwise designated by the Board of Directors.

# Section 3. Actions required/permitted to be taken by the Board of Directors may be done without a noticed meeting, if two-thirds of Board of Directors agree. Such consent and record of action shall be recorded in next official Board of Directors' meeting minutes.

Article VIII: Officers:

Section 7. The Secretary shall keep a record of proceedings of the Yellowstone Valley Audubon Society and its Board of Directors. and shall be the custodian of the Corporate Seal. The Secretary shall distribute minutes to the Board of Directors in a timely fashion, maintain records of all meetings, preserve all correspondence relating to the Yellowstone Valley Audubon Society, and perform other duties as the Board may direct.

#### Article IX: Board of Directors

Section 2. The Board of Directors shall consist of the Officers (See Article VIII, Section 2), the Immediate Past President, and that number of Members as specified in Section 5 of this Article, all of whom must be in good standing. If there is no immediate Past President, there shall be elected one additional Member to the Board of Directors.

#### Section 7. Any Member of the Board of Directors may be removed from the Board, with a vote of no confidence, by a two thirds vote of the Board of Directors. Any Member of Yellowstone Valley Audubon Society may request in writing to the Board of Directors that any Officer or Board Member be removed.

Article XI Quorum

Section 1. A quorum for the purpose of holding any meeting *or vote* of the Members shall be ten percent of the Members or 20 Members, whichever is less, *and unless otherwise provided*.

Section 2. A quorum for the purpose of holding any meeting or vote of the Board of Directors shall be a simple majority.

#### Article XIV Commitments and Limitations

Section 2. The Officers and Board of Directors shall not be liable to the Yellowstone Valley Audubon Society for any mistake or judgment, negligent or otherwise, except for their own individual willful misconduct or bad faith. The Membership of the Yellowstone Valley Audubon Society shall indemnify and hold harmless each of the Officers and Members of the Board of Directors from and against all contractual liability to others arising out of contracts made by Officers or Members of the Board of Directors on behalf of the Yellowstone Valley Audubon Society, unless such contract shall have been in bad faith or contrary to the provisions of Montana law or these by-laws, except that such liability is satisfied by Directors' and Officers' liability insurance. Officers and Members of the Board of Directors shall have no personal liability with respect to any contract made by them on behalf of the Yellowstone Valley Audubon Society.
