ELECTIONS AND FINANCES

NOTICE OF ELECTIONS: As stated in Article V, Section 1 of the YVAS by-laws, "the Annual Meeting shall be held in May of each year". At such time, officers and directors shall be elected by a majority vote of the members present. The Nominating Committee recommends the following officers for election: Steve Regele, President; Pam Pipal, Treasurer; and Doreen Hartman, Secretary. The Vice President position remains vacant.

Members of the Board Directors shall serve a term of two years. Half of the directors shall be elected in even years and half in odd years. The Nominating Com-

mittee recommends electing the following director for two years: Dorothy Bartlett.

In addition to the annual business meeting of electing board officers and directors, and approving financials, the May 18th Membership Meeting program will include a presentation by the Billings Community Foundation (BCF). BCF is a non-profit, tax-exempt innovative community fund governed by local citizens that promotes philanthropy and charitable giving in the Billings area. After carefully researching the needs of our organization and services in the Billings area, the YVAS Board of Directors recently joined with BCF to manage the endowment fund. We have established an unrestricted endowment fund with BCF, which allows the YVAS board to direct the use of the money,



while BCF manages how the funds are invested. BCF has several additional programs that benefit individuals as well as organizations. Some of these programs and how they benefit YVAS will be presented at this meeting.

YVAS President Steve Regele put together a map of common YVAS bird trip sites, and a table of coordinate locations for the mapped sites, which was developed by the Field Trip Committee. Designed for both 'seasoned' birders familiar with the area's resources and for new or visiting birders, it is a valuable addition to the YVAS library. INJURED RAPTORS, WATERFOWL, AND OTHER BIRDS

The YVAS Board of Directors has developed guidelines for anyone encountering injured birds. These guidelines are based on federal and state laws which regulate management of injured wildlife; in some cases it is advised that "If you care, leave it there". To read the complete guidelines, visit <u>vvaudubon.org</u>. Below is a list of resources you can contact to assist with injured birds.

- For injured or twine-entangled **Ospreys**, call Dr. Marco Restani at 406-425-2608 asap. If possible, stay by the raptor until help arrives. If you cannot reach Dr. Restani, call Deb Regele at 406-962-3115. For injured Ospreys, you can also call the Montana Raptor Conservation Center at 406-585-1211.
- For all other injured raptors, call Montana Raptor Conservation Center (MRCC) at 406-585-1211- quickly. If possible, stay by the raptor until help arrives. MRCC has local contacts for assistance. After hours contact numbers are: Becky Kean at 406-570-6215 or 406-586-0002.
- For **waterfowl**, call WJH Bird Resources at 406-652-7175. If possible, stay by the bird until help arrives.
- For all other birds including game birds, call the MT Fish, Wildlife and Parks Monday through Friday at 406-247-2940. If they are willing to accept them, injured birds can be taken to Moore Lane Veterinary Clinic temporarily until transportation can be arranged.

You can also call YVAS' injured bird transport contact, Jeanette Tasey, at 406-669-3169 for assistance.

SATURDAY APRIL 11 EXXON PONDS/EMERALD HILLS

On a mid-April morning that went from cloudy to warm sunshine to cool winds, 16 birders led by Ron Kuhler and George Mowat walked the fields of Exxon Ponds and saw Bald Eagles and Red-tailed Hawks soaring and sailing in the skies. For many, the Red Tailed Hawks above the Emerald Hills overlook provided the major thrills of the day. For the five or six birders who were walking closely behind Ron, the flushing of two mature Great Horned Owls right in front of us was surely the event of the day.

On the ponds, the ducks seen included Common Merganser, Mallard, American Wigeon, Double-crested Cormorants, Northern Shovelers and Gadwall. Four Gadwall were seen flying in a courtship formation according to Jim Hansen. Song Sparrows and Red-winged Blackbirds, Wild Turkeys and Ring-necked pheasants provided springtime music.

Spying a Great Blue Heron and two Snow Geese added to our list. Mountain Bluebirds, a Downy Woodpecker, Western Meadowlark and a few other species were seen as we enjoyed a standup lunch at the overlook before the winds kicked up and we left for home. CONSERVATION NEWS

So far this year, five new Osprey poles and platforms have been installed along the Yellowstone River, all a result of birds nesting on active power poles in 2014. By April 21, three of the five platforms were occupied by content Osprey couples. Yellowstone Valley Electric installed two of these new poles and platforms on River Road in March 2015, at no cost to YVAS. This year YVAS is fortunate to have Boy Scout Sean Ellis monitoring one of these new platforms with sticks. A few weeks later, returning Ospreys readily adopted the new nesting sites. Sean monitors the nest a few miles west of Duck Creek on a weekly basis, with additional visits when needed. He is also keeping his eye out for "repeat offenders" that have a fetish for nesting on active power lines.

On another note, Ospreys returning to the new nesting platform at Swinging Bridge were not as impressed as those who returned to River Road. For several days, Beartooth Electric linesmen removed sticks placed by the returnees on the old
