Saturday, August 6 Shorebirds, Hawks, & Prairie Birds

A group of 10 birders left Rocky Mountain College and headed for the Broadview Ponds. Prior to reaching the destination we stopped along HWY 3 and counted 23 Burrowing Owls. The total species count for the day was 33. We saw Red-necked Phalarope, Wilson's Snipe, and feeding in mud flats on the pond were Greater Yellowlegs and Semipalmated Sandpipers. In the distance, across the pond were White-faced Ibis and Eared Grebes. Several hawks were seen around the pond but the raptor of the day was a Merlin who stirred up flocks of birds off the pond. After leaving the pond we weren't disappointed to find a Great Horned Owl in a big old tree nearby. The one less common bird that provided a thrill was the Upland Sandpiper out on the plains. Fri-Sun August 19-21 <u>BOWDOIN NWR, NELSON RESERVOIR AND ZORTMAN CAMPGROUND</u>

Twelve avid birders headed north for Bowdoin NWR on Friday morning and spotted several species along the way including Hawks, American Kestrel, and Sandhill Cranes. Besides the avian sightings, Ruth Vanderhorst, Lois Gorseth, and Pam Pipal caught sight of a Bobcat going for roadkill on the side of the highway.

We stopped for lunch and birding at James Kipp Recreation Area and saw several species, including White-breasted Nuthatch, Lazuli Bunting, Western Tanager, American Redstart, Warbling Vireo, Red-eyed Vireo, both a Hairy and Downy Woodpeckers, and many Eastern Kingbirds.

Before our final destination we stopped at Nelson Reservoir, and hit a bonanza of waterfowl and shorebirds. Of note were the Common Loon; American Avocet; White-faced Ibis; 3 kinds of Gulls, Franklin, California, and Ring-billed; Caspian and Common Terns; Stilt Sandpipers; and on-shore, Bullock's Oriole and thanks to Dorothy Bartlett, 4 nestling Barn Swallows in a grove of trees.

Safely checked in for the night at Malta, the birding wasn't over, with sightings of Common Nighthawks and Chimney Swifts right from the motel parking lot.

On Saturday we headed to Bowdoin NWR and saw species too numerous to mention in this accounting. The highlight of the day, by far, was due to Lois Gorseth's persistence in getting our attention, Brian Henderson's reaction of "holy cow!", and Peter Cummins' identification, of a Harlequin Duck. (See Brian Henderson's photo of the Harlequin Duck on the cover of this months Flyer.) Other highlights were a Virginia Rail, 2 Sora, a side-water collection of hundreds of Long-billed and Short-billed Dowitchers, some Red-necked Phalaropes, and on-shore a rare Pine Warbler, a Wilson's Warbler, and 2 Baltimore Orioles.

Sunday we took off early to get to Zortman Campground. Between the main highway and the campground many Mountain Bluebirds were seen. At the campground among the species seen were Ovenbirds, Red-breasted Nuthatch, Swainson's Thrush, and Common Yellowthroat.

Many thanks to Ruth for her leadership and expertise, and to Brian for expertise and e-bird listings. And thanks to the birders who shared their spotting scope sightings with the rest of us!

Total species for the trip: 123, including 3 indeterminate of the duck, teal, and peep variety!

Montana Audubon Center's: Annual Fundraising Event



Montana Audubon formally invites Yellowstone Valley Audubon Society members to attend the Center's annual fundraiser, Evening Under the Big Sky. Join fellow bird enthusiasts and members of the Billings community on Saturday evening, September 17 to celebrate the success of place-based nature education at the Montana Audubon Center. The event begins at 5:00 pm and will take place on the Center grounds, located at 7026 South Billings Blvd.

Education programs at the Center expanded during the past 12 months, consistent with an eight-year growth trend. More than 5,000 people of all ages and backgrounds participated in nature education programming at our Billings location. The Center's flagship program, Audubon Naturalists in the Schools (ANTS), reached 38 fourth-grade classrooms during the 2015-2016 school year. Twelve new classrooms will join the program this fall. Center staff also launched the pilot year of the Fledglings Nature Preschool in 2015; the wait-listed program will expand to 5 days a week this fall.

Evening Under the Big Sky is an opportunity for YVAS members to help celebrate these successes and more. The evening will feature live bluegrass music from some of Billings' most well-known musicians, and local food and beverages will be served. The festive fundraiser will include a silent auction and live auction games to benefit our education and restoration programs. We hope to see you and look forward to your continued support.

Osprey Platform

As the end of August approaches, most of this year's young Ospreys have fledged. I would not be surprised if a few of the Osprey nest monitors are quietly saying to themselves, it's about time! This year there were upwards of 120 Osprey nestlings observed along the Yellowstone River and that is only from those nests we know exist. However, some of these nests did not succeed, some nestlings were lost to predation, and some were lost to severe storms and some to unknown causes.

Earlier this month, Marco reported to the monitors that he banded more nestlings this year than in previous years along the Yellowstone River. This year topped out at 83 for a total of 287 Osprey nestlings since 2012. Nest monitors also watch for banded Osprey's that have returned to breed. This years hatch will be back roughly in 2019 to challenge the monitors' abilities to read numbers on the bands.

Thank you to all YVAS Osprey Nest Monitors for your support and assistance with this project. Without your data, banding and data for the Montana Natural Heritage Program would not be possible. Thank you to the companies with bucket trucks that assisted Marco with the banding.



Bird of the Month Eastern Screech-Owl

With an attention getting mysterious trill in the night, this spooky sound comes from an owl no bigger than a pint glass. Common east of the Rockies, the Eastern Screech-Owl is found wherever there are trees. Supremely camouflaged birds hide out in tree crannies during the day, so listen for them at night.
