## Osprey's: A Review of Population Ecology, Behavior, and Conservation by Dr. Marco Restani

Monday, October 17, 2016 at 7PM

John James Audubon wrote of Ospreys: "The habits of this famed bird differ so materially from those of almost all others of its genus, that an accurate description of them cannot fail to be highly interesting to the student of nature." His words still apply today. Watching an Osprey dive feet first into the water, sometimes submerging completely, before rising from the surface with a struggling fish leaves a lasting impression for birder and non-birder alike. Ospreys are one of Montana's most recognizable and charismatic raptors, nesting throughout the western third of the state and along large rivers in the prairies. The Yellowstone Valley Audubon Society in Billings has monitored Osprey nests along the Yellowstone River since 2009. YVAS focuses conservation efforts on Ospreys because the population is increasing, most pairs are building nests on power poles and thereby coming into conflict with utility companies, and nestling mortality from entanglement in baling twine is evident. In 2009 three volunteers located 22 nests while today 30 volunteers hustle along 300 miles of river during summer to monitor over 85 nests. Marco Restani, Director of Conservation for Montana Audubon, directs the research components of the YVAS Osprey project. His presentation will review population ecology, behavior, and conservation of this widespread, unique raptor.

### Tuesday, September 8, 2016 Riverfront Park

With cars parked on both sides of South Billings Boulevard to within the last ½ mile leading up to the Riverfront Park turnoff, and densely parked cars within the Park as viewed from the Boulevard, only the most determined birder dared venture into the Park itself, to find a parking spot. Three birders found parking and then found one another, one (a new YVAS member) by the binocular-around-the-neck field marking and the other (George Mowat) by habitat (near the usual field trip meeting place). Hundreds of two-legged specimens were spotted this day, in every size and color, of species (junior high school) Cross-Country Runner. The birders took to the woods to avoid the migration route of the Runners, and saw a few other species, such as one Hummingbird (unknown species), overhead Gulls and Double-crested Cormorants. In the water were Mallards and Canada Geese, and heard but not seen, were Chickadees and Northern Flickers. Getting out of the Park was not a problem, as most of the cars and Runners had left.

Here is what the field trip leader, Mike Weber had to say:

"I ended up parking on the NE corner of Lake Josephine. Since I was supposed to lead the trip I felt determined to look for other birders, so I searched the woods for birders and birds. Obviously I did not find the birders. The woods were pretty quiet, and only saw a total of 14 bird species. Notable birds were an Orange Crowned Warbler, a handful of Wilson Warblers and an American Redstart. An Osprey was seen and a Belted Kingfisher was heard rattling. Also saw a vireo-could not id the species. Downy Woodpeckers and one male Hairy Woodpecker. On the river was a Great Blue Heron and a couple Common Mergansers. I regret not finding the other birders. I really enjoyed seeing the Redstart, and lamented on knowing that I probably won't see another until next May."

## Saturday, September 17, 2016 Pryor Mountains

By popular demand, Carolyn Jones was asked to share her fabulous Flan recipe she made for the La Noche Cubana pre-Chapter meeting potluck last month. If you missed it we're sorry but with her generous sharing of the recipe you can try it out on your own.

### **INGREDIENTS:**

### 2/3 cup white sugar

1 (14 oz.) can condensed milk

2 cups heavy cream

1 cup milk

5 eggs

2 tsps. Vanilla extract

### **DIRECTIONS:**

1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees. While oven is heating, put in to warm either a 1.5 quart glass casserole or a 8x8 Pyrex baking dish. 2. In a small non stick saucepan, heat the sugar over medium heat. Shake and swirl occasionally to distribute the sugar until it is melted and begins to brown. Lift the saucepan over the heat source (4-6 inches) and continue to brown to a dark golden brown. Remove the casserole from the oven, place on a towel. Pour the caramelized into it and swirl to coat the bottom. 3. In a mixer bowl, combine the sweetened condensed milk, cream, milk, eggs and vanilla. Mix on high about 1 minute until fluffy. Pour over the caramelized sugar. 4. Place the filled casserole into a larger pan and add 1 inch of HOT water to the outer pan. Bake in the preheated oven for 60-70 minutes, or until set. It may take longer. 5. Allow the flan to cool completely. Run a knife around the edge to loosen. Invert a plate with sides or a pan over flan and flip. The syrup will be on top of the flan.
