The Board of Directors of Yellowstone Valley Audubon held its monthly meeting October 11, 2016. Points of discussion from the September and October meetings were as follows:

Steve Linder has assumed the position of Vice President on the YVAS Board. He and Steve Regele have been investigating conservation and education projects.

Deb Regele reported that the 2016 Osprey Project is mostly complete and most reports are in. The annual Osprey Picnics were held September 10 in Billings, and October 1 for the Livingston area watchers

The Board discussed a collaboration with Yellowstone River Conservation District Council to apply for a grant for the establishment of a location and facility to store baling twine for recycling. Due to the scope and commitment required for a project of this magnitude, Deb Regele and Doreen Hartman agreed to investigate further. It is critical to find a location that is large enough and convenient for drop-off and pick-up of the twine. They are looking for assistance and volunteers from the YVAS membership.

Don Bartlett reported that Powell, Wyoming birders want to partner with us on joint birding trip. The Birding Trip Committee will be working with them to select a birding area and leader.

Steve Regele reported that the Program Committee has a full slate of programs for the 2016-17 year, with several special presentations being considered as well.

The Board discussed consulting with an expert in advertising and public relations to promote special presentations. Steve Regele pointed out that we have excellent meetings, birding trips, and conservation projects, and they need to be publicized better. Dorothy Barton will follow up with a member who has expressed interest in helping YVAS and has a background in publicity.

The November chapter meeting will be preceded by a no-host Potluck dinner. Donations will be solicited to help defray the cost of the facility.

Sue Weinreis will coordinate a Christmas Dessert potluck to be held prior to the Christmas program.

There were no official Field Trips in October, however, *Mike Weber submitted* the following notes regarding a recent trip to Lake Mason, near Roundup, MT:

I dreamed about a day at the beach for weeks, and I thought a trip to Lake Mason would fulfill my longing for some time in the sun, the wind and the water. I traded my bathing suit for winter wear and was joined by a couple of birding buddies, Will Crain and Brain Henderson.

We were met on the South border of Lake Mason NWR by an adult Ferruginous Hawk perched on a utility pole which turned out to be a talisman for the day. The last mile to the lake the gumbo road was rutted and muddy and by the time we neared the lakes edge I felt fortunate to not to have gotten stuck!

The lake was filled with many waterfowl with large rafts of American Coots numbering in the hundreds. In the NW corner of the lake were a handful of Tundra Swans, all adults. A half-dozen Sandhill Cranes flapped just on the horizon. Canvasbacks were the most numerous divers along with a few Redheads, Buffleheads and Ring-necked Ducks. Ruddy Ducks hung with Grebes, both Western and Eared. Many of the dabbling ducks were already transforming from brown August ducks to their spring colors. Mallards, Gadwall, American Wigeon and Northern Shoveler's familiar field marks were beginning to pop.

Very near us along the waters edge and mudflats was a large flock of busily feeding Long-billed Dowitchers. I tried counting each one and lost tract at 252. Among them was a very diminutive sparrow sized shorebird with yellow legs, a Least Sandpiper. Initially, we thought we had seen a few Baird's Sandpipers but we noted the stronger contrast between the heavily streaked breast and the white belly and the yellow legs, and the overall heavier looking bill and felt grateful to observe four Pectoral Sandpipers instead. The Baird's Sandpipers have dark legs unlike the birds we observed. At least two dozen Greater Yellowlegs fed in the shallow water. Numerous Killdeer called and scurried about and a dozen Avocet milled in belly deep water a quarter mile to the West.

Flocks of American Pipits and Horned Larks flew nervously around calling and briefly pausing on the mudflats before taking to the air. We were lucky to see a couple of Lapland Longspur's with the flocks. A late migrant Vesper Sparrow paused in some greasewood. An adult Bald Eagle stirred the ducks into the air. A Northern Harrier dive bombed ducks in the middle of the lake. A lone Common Raven flew in silence high overhead.

None of us wanted this day to end we enjoyed watching all the birds and soaking in the atmosphere. I became mesmerized by the simple beauty of this quiet refuge. A refuge not only for birds but birders, too.

Submissions from Sue Weinreis, Osprey Nest Monitor postings from last summer.

Home Alone I arrived in my full mosquito armor and took a concealed position at approximated 5:26 pm to find the children ALONE in the nest, the biggest one in the "shade" position, mouth open. A family of 5 with 3 small children approached and the female (osprey) arrived loudly vocalizing. The two nestlings dove down into the nest (they are well-behaved). The family stopped and hesitated, reluctant to continue, probably because they saw me in my mosquito jacket, hooded, veiled, and lurking in the underbrush, wielding what could only be an uzi. I waved and beckoned and they screwed their courage to the sticking point and approached. I, of course, being the proud surrogate grandmother of twin osprey-lets, bored them with osprey facts and lore as the female circled us, loudly protesting. The male was perched serenely in his favorite tree. As I left, the female was back on the nest and I saw two little heads again. I have seen them up previously stretching wings, pooping, etc., but today it was just too hot to be flailing around in a small enclosed mite-ridden space. July 18, 2016

Empty Nest I arrived at 3:30 pm, in the heat of the day, to find the nest empty and no osprey to be seen. Smart birds! It was blistering hot! I wish I was hanging around the water fishing, too. Kind of lonesome. The first time EVER that I have been to this nest and not seen the male in His Spot. I walked down along the river and checked the trees on both sides, but no sign of the little family. Did I hear an osprey calling? Maybe not....I lingered for a while, listening to the cicadas. Then I walked over under the nest. The truck tracks were still there from the banding. Many sticks suitable for nest-building littered the ground under the platform. Feels like summer is over. Sigh. August 14, 2016

BILLINGS, MT - Snowy, blustery days are a good time to put another log on the fire and simmer a pot of Montana beef stew on the stove. But what about the great pristine days between storms when you are itching to get outside but wondering where to go and what to do.

The Yellowstone Valley Audubon Society (YVAS) has one answer. Birding. It is a wonderful activity achievable by seniors that offers many opportunities to get outdoors. And there is very little equipment required other than a bird book and field glasses.

YVAS offers birding support in several ways. First, they offer monthly programs September through May on the third Monday of the month at 7 p.m. at Mayflower Congregation Church after brief business meetings. These meetings and programs are open to the public and a good time to start learning about birding. Second, the YVAS website at <a href="www.yvaudubon.org/">www.yvaudubon.org/</a> has maps that show some local and regional Hotspots for Birding and list the birds that have been sighted at these sites. To further help those who are interested in becoming birders they have installed their first sign at one of these sites that acquaints visitors with what birds may be found there. 

# YVAS Bird of the Month Red Kite (Milvus milvus)

Length, 23-26 inches Wingspan 56-64 inches

Food: rodents, small birds & carrion. Habitat: Hilly areas with deciduous woodland mixed with open fields. In flight they are recognizable by their forked tail.

In the early 20<sup>th</sup> century, the Red Kite was virtually eradicated as a breeding bird in the UK, except for a small population in Central Wales. In the late 1980s, a re-introduction program by the Royal Society for the Protection of Birds (RSPB) resulted in the release of young Kites in the Chilterns, where my sister lives in Princes Risborough, about 50 miles north of London.
