North American Eagle Survey and other BLM Dillon Field Office Projects, Katie Benzel, Wildlife Biologist

The purpose of the Midwinter Eagle survey is to monitor the status of eagle wintering populations in the contiguous United States by estimating national and regional count trends, overall and by age class. Each January, several hundred individuals count eagles along standard, nonoverlapping survey routes. YVAS has participated in this survey for many years. The 2017 YVAS Midwinter Eagle Survey was held January 2017.

Katie Benzel, Wildlife Biologist with BLM Dillon Field Office will talk about the eagle survey history and findings. She will also discuss some other interesting and important projects involving BLM, her work, and interactions with wildlife and wildlife management.

Nationwide counts of eagles were coordinated by the National Wildlife Federation from 1979 until 1992, when the Raptor Research and Technical Assistance Center/US Geological Survey assumed responsibility for overseeing the count. Initial objectives of the survey were to establish an index to the total wintering Bald Eagle population in the lower 48 states, to determine eagle distribution during a standardized survey period, and to identify previously unrecognized areas of important winter habitat.

Beginning in 1984, National Wildlife Federation officials asked participants in each state to count eagles along standard routes to provide data on count trends. Standard survey routes were defined as clearly described areas where eagles had been observed in the past. Katie has been the Montana coordinator for several years and organizes many private volunteers who participate in the survey. Sizes of survey routes vary from single fixed points to 150 miles. The number of states participating each year has ranged from 38 to 49, and the number of standard survey routes per state ranges from 1 to 80. *Submitted by Steve Regele.* Bald Eagle, *photo by Dan Casey.*

Osprey Platform

Are you enjoying snow shoveling as much as Steve and I are this winter? A person just can't have enough snow and shovels, right? Wrong! Bring on spring with the return of Sandhill Cranes, Snow Geese, Tundra Swans and Ospreys!

For the past few weeks, YVAS' Osprey Nest Monitors have been confirming their commitments to monitor Osprey nests this spring and summer with a monitor return rate of 100%!

Two new groups have joined the YVAS Osprey Nest Monitors this year. The Environmental Science class at Absarokee High School will be monitoring the nest at Swinging Bridge on Hwy 78 and a newly formed birding group in Miles City has individuals willing to lend a hand in the Forsyth and Miles City areas. Marco Restani will travel and present an Osprey Orientation Program to each of these new groups.

2016 was a tremendously successful year for the Osprey Nest Monitoring Project. Just for fun, I tallied the total number of Osprey fledglings (young that left the nest) that were reported by the YVAS Osprey Nest Monitors for each of the last five years. The tallies are taken from the data sheets that I submitted to the MT Natural Heritage Program. As you can see, that number has more than doubled.

Please remember though, this is not a scientifically "pure" overview since the number of nest monitors has increased both upstream and downstream giving the project better surveillance of the existing nests. The number of nestlings that Marco has banded each year since 2012 has also steadily increased. I have included a portion of Marco's banding data for each of the five years. This project began in 2009.

2016 - 120 fledglings; 83 banded 2015 - 111 fledglings; 70 banded 2014 - 89 fledglings; 58 banded 2013 - 74 fledglings; 40 banded 2012 - 53 fledglings; 36 banded

We are still looking for Osprey Nest Monitors in a few of the outlying areas. YVAS Reports Uncommon Bird Sightings Submitted by Barbara Garrett

Yellowstone Valley Audubon Society (YVAS) reports more than 30 unusual and special interest bird sightings in the Billings and surrounding areas by its members in 2016 including such species as the Tundra Swan and Surf Scoter. The Tundra Swan nests in the tundra and is uncommon and local in the winter in the United States. The Surf Scoter nests in the tundra and winters on coastal waters.

"Some of our members' sightings were rare or only occasionally occurring in Montana, some are of birds that are rare in some locations while common in other locations in Montana, and some sightings seem to be showing up more often in recent years," Steve Regele, YVAS president, said.

While spotting birds is a passion for birdwatchers, spotting birds in places where they are not normally seen can quicken their hearts. This phenomena of birds in unusual places is called vagrancy. According to Audubon experts there are multiple reasons for vagrancy and frequently the vagrancy that is occurring is not clearly understood. A short term drought or habitat change in core areas can cause it. So might global climate change. And it is not uncommon for migrating species to get a little off course ... particularly for young birds. Whatever the reason such sightings can cause quite a stir.

Anyone can report or review reports online with the eBird website that has been launched by the Cornell Laboratory of Ornithology and National Audubon. And a complete list and description of birds found in Montana is available at the Montana Natural Heritage Program Field Guide website where anyone can also report observations. A list of some of the unusual and other bird sightings by YVAS members in 2016 in and around the Billings area is available at yvaudubon.org. The YVAS website also carries information on schedules and opportunities for joining YVAS birding trips, bird classes, and other bird related activities.

Early in February, YVAS member, Robert Hill submitted these photographs of two injured raptors that he helped transport to the Montana Raptor Center in Bozeman, MT. The Great Horned Owl on the bottom left was from Miles City. Robert reported the lengthy transport and relay of volunteers involved in rescuing the Snowy Owl pictured on the bottom right. The owl was injured in Raymond, MT and was picked up by a volunteer from Glendive on a Thursday and then transported into the town of Glendive. Next the bird was transported on to Miles City making it through another volunteer to Billings at midnight where Robert took the owl on to Reedpoint to rendezvous with the Montana Raptor Center folks from Bozeman.
