

Saturday, May 25th Bridger Creek

This late May day was a brief respite in between rain, snow, and thunderstorms and promised to be a nice day for birding out along Bridger Creek. Fourteen of us met at Itch-Kep-Pe Park in Columbus to begin our trip with leader Stan Heath. Travelling along the lower portion of the Bridger Creek road, we saw sparrows—Vesper, Lark, Chipping. Yellow Warblers and House Wrens were active, and we were continuously serenaded by the squeaks, mewls, and warbles of the Gray Catbird. Our target bird for the day was the Lewis's Woodpecker, and we searched high and low for this bird all along the main Bridger Creek road with no luck. But we did see a Hairy Woodpecker, White-breasted Nuthatch and many other birds. We heard a Rough Grouse drumming in the brush. We all had nice looks at the colorful Lazuli Bunting and Bullock's Oriole.

We drove further up Bridger Creek—no Lewis's Woodpeckers. We took a side road—no Lewis's Woodpecker. Towards the end of our birding day, we drove down the road that eventually goes out to the Stillwater River and Absarokee, and, finally, there was our bird. The woodpecker flitted around a bit but not far, and several people were able to put their scopes on it. We all had great views. Further on, we saw more birds for a total of 4 Lewis's Woodpeckers. The day was a success. On our way out to the Stillwater River, we saw a Long-billed Curlew and some members of the group spotted a Peregrine Falcon. We ended up with a total of 59 species for the day.

Tuesday, May 28 Stillwater River and Woodbine Area

A dozen birders set off on a cloudy morning hoping to see birds and not rain. Itch-Kep-Pe Campground at Columbus produced a Tennessee Warbler and a Fox Sparrow for Stan Heath's group right away, and American Redstarts were heard but not seen. The prize at Fireman's Point FAS on the Stillwater River was a Warbling Vireo and a Wilson's Snipe. At Cliff Swallow FAS, in front of us before we dismounted, we saw a show off Red-eyed Vireo in a riverbank shrub, White-crowned, Chipping, and Lark sparrows feeding on the ground and in the SUNSHINE! Flying to and from a nesting hole in the rock face across the Stillwater River was a Say's Phoebe. At Castle Rock FAS for the twenty something year at the same campsite, a Calliope Hummingbird was perched on bare sticks at the top of a shrub patch and doing his high dive display. We also had a preview look at a Western Tanager (see below). At Woodbine campground the prize for those with acute hearing was a Golden-crowned Kinglet, Hammond's and Dusky Flycatchers. Ruby-crowned Kinglets were heard and seen chasing at knee level. At the end of the Fiddler Creek route a mile before Fishtail we saw the best display of the day. A male Western Tanager started fly catching off the top fence wire beside the road behind the last car. He moved forward one insect sortie at a time, to the front of the line of cars and beyond, even with birders standing outside their cars! More than 60 species were listed for the trip. Thanks to Ruth Vanderhorst for leading this annual trip.

Sat/Sun, June 1&2 BIRDATHON 2019 Final Report

June 1 at 5 pm five teams of YVAS birders began their searches for as many species as they could find and identify in the next 24 hours. The element of competition was in the air as the teams went far and wide to find species. These 5 teams were all experienced at Birdathon and all five were repeats from last year when a record 160 species were found by the collective groups. The desire to best that record was a motivating force for the teams. The Avian Rangers, with Mike Weber, Will Crain, Brian Henderson and Robert Hill, has a long record of winning the team competition and again this year led all teams with 136 species. They also should be recognized for finding a rare species, Yellowthroated Vireo. As the experienced birders they are, they notified Dan Casey so the record of their find can go forward. The team bearing the name, this year, of Back Again came in second with 128 species. One team member, Tony Cummins, came all the way from England to participate again. This is his third YVAS Birdathon. His brother, Peter Cummins leads the team which includes his wife Helen Carlson. Senior Moments came in third with 103. This team has lost members and this year included Jeanne Olson, Sue Weinreis and Ruth Vanderhorst. The team won the first in this series of Birdathons in 2011 with 97 species. Coming in fourth was Steve and Deb Regele with 99 species. This year they had multiple events that could have made them unsuccessful, but they did overcome the flat tire and multiple other conditions. They should get the adversity award this year! Though they are in fifth place this year, Rosebud, a team with Brenda and Jeff Dunham bird, as they did last year in their first Birdathon, from East Rosebud Lake to Billings. This year they contributed several species that added mountain birds to the collective list and allowed us to beat last year's collective total of 160 with an additional 5 species...grand total 165!! With that good news fresh in our minds, the birders celebrated with sharing of experiences and a relaxed potluck feast. We all look forward to next year. Tuesday, June 15 Pryor Mountains-Sage Creek

Five people met at the Bridger rest area for the trip into the Pryor Mountains, unfortunately due to the weather we were unable to go to Sage Creek, but went instead along Railway Rd. This did not stop an excellent day of birding. First stop was at the sewage ponds in Bridger, which produced 3 male Wood Ducks, Rudy Duck, Cassin's Finch and a Violetgreen Swallow. A Sora was also heard. There was neither sight nor sound of the Blue Grosbeak today, but further along Pryor Mountain Rd a Brown Thrasher showed well and was in full song. A Sage Thrasher was not going to be out done. Some Pinyon Jays showed themselves and Yellow-breasted Chats were in full song,

The highlight for me was seeing my first Sagebrush Sparrow, in Montana. Thank you Stan and Jeanne for your efforts in locating this bird. A very enjoyable trip was had by everyone with over 60 species seen. Thank you Stan Heath for leading the field trip.

Saturday, June 15 Red Lodge Area


Gentle spring weather and great bird views made a rewarding bird watcher's field trip under the leadership of Stan Heath and Jerry Dalton. The first stop was Nichol's Creek south of Red Lodge where there were sounds and views of hummingbirds (Broad-tailed, Calliope), flycatchers (Western Wood-Pewee, Eastern Kingbird, Least Flycatcher), woodpeckers (Hairy Woodpecker, Northern Flicker, Red-naped Sapsucker), Warbling Vireo, Clark's Nutcracker, Mountain Bluebird, Cassin's Finch, McGillivray's Warbler, Lincoln's Sparrow and more. After a quiet stop at Palisades campground, we 13 birders traveled to Meeteetse Trail's first riparian area and were rewarded with sites and/or sounds of House Wrens, American Dipper, Tree Swallow, Red-breasted Nuthatch, American Goldfinches, American Redstart, Ovenbird as well as other species. During our lunch stop at Stan's home Black-headed Grosbeak, Red Crossbills and Pine Siskins were added to our lists as well as songs of Ruby-crowned Kinglets which were also heard at previous stops. Some of the birds that were along Willow Creek Road northwest of Red Lodge were Savannah Sparrow, Western Meadowlark and Bobolink. At Wagon Wheel Estates the highlight for some birders was a brief siting of a Northern Waterthrush which ended a great day of bird watching.

Sunday, June 30 East Rosebud Lake
