Wednesday, September 11 Riverfront Park

I waited alone in the rain. I was sure was going solo, when a minute past 5 a VW bug pulled up and the occupant identified stated he was here for the bird trip. He told me he was surprised that I even showed and I was equally surprised that anyone showed up. He forgot his raincoat and binoculars but was still eager to go.

We started our walk on the asphalt the first couple hundred yards were quiet with only a Northern Flicker and an Osprey spotted. We turned toward the river and took a winding course to get there while we adhered to the fall birding mantra of "follow the Chickadee." You would think with the rain the birds would be invisible. But the chattering Black-capped Chickadees attracted other migrants. Each flock of Chickadees had a few migrants warblers with them. We observed Wilson Warblers and Orange-crowned Warblers in the willows and cottonwoods near the river. A Russian olive thicket held a mewing Grey Catbird.

Near the river we heard a Killdeer, a Spotted Sandpiper and a mature Bald Eagle winged by. A flock of Ring-billed Gulls loafed at the end of a gravel bar. Here my sodden companion returned, headed home and I trekked on in search of more birds. The walk paid off as I encountered a Yellow-rumped Warbler and a Ruby-crowned Kinglet hanging out with the Chickadees. A handful of American Goldfinches were seen along with a solo Belted Kingfisher.17 species observed.

Saturday, Sept. 14 Red Lodge Area Hawk Watch

Submitted (with photo) by Marco Restani In mid-September six YVAS members settled into their comfy lawn chairs for a taxing day of hawk watching. The sky was mostly clear with temperatures in the 70s and light winds. It was tough duty but the group rose to the occasion and between entertaining stories they stayed focused and counted 84 raptors of 11 species. Not a bad day below the palisades of Meeteetse Trail! The top three species counted were Turkey Vulture (23), Sharpshinned Hawk (21), and Red-tailed Hawk (17). A Broadwinged Hawk, Red-tailed Hawk, and Peregrine Falcon regaled us with undulating flight displays as they passed over the cliffs. Other raptors observed included Osprey, Northern Harrier, Cooper's Hawk, Golden Eagle, American Kestrel, and Merlin. Small groups of White-throated Swifts, Clark's Nutcrackers, and Yellow-rumped Warblers also kept us company throughout the day. We recorded a total of 27 species.

Osprey Nest Monitors celebrated the migration of adult and fledgling Ospreys with the annual Osprey Migration Picnic. This year the picnic was hosted by Jeanne and Stu Coleman in the beautiful Paradise Valley. As one of my favorite events, it gives us a chance to meet new monitors and reacquaint friendships with others.

Over the last eight years, Marco Restani has banded over 475 nestlings plus one adult. Osprey nest monitors have adjusted, with a little prodding, to be on the watch for banded adults that return each year as well as the success of their assigned nest and its fledglings. YVAS began the project of locating, monitoring and recording data on Osprey nests along the Yellowstone, Stillwater and Big Horn Rivers in 2009. The nest data is shared with the MT Natural Heritage Program and the banding data is recorded with USGS Patuxent.

This was an interesting year for Ospreys and many of the 37 nest monitors as they observed Osprey nests along these rivers. Due to weather, predation, human disturbance and/or other unknown causes, all of the known Osprey nests downstream from Billings failed for the first time since YVAS began monitoring. However, the overall Osprey numbers along the Yellowstone are still good.

The photo is of twine beads mailed to YVAS by I-90 Reprocessing. Baling twine is cleaned and melted down. Then it is cooled through a method that results in beads the size of small coffee beans. The beads are shipped to factories that recycle them into outdoor buckets, pots and other containers. Twine is Type 5 plastic or polypropylene (PP). **See the submission on Twine Collection & Recycling Site by Deb Regele on page 4 of this Flyer.
