In addition, one had his blood drawn for heavy metal testing. With the help of Yellowstone Valley Tree Surgeons, Tom Yelvington provided and ran the lift truck so Professor Marko Restoni could bring the chicks down for testing. Renee Seacor, the YVAS intern from Rocky Mountain College, was the 'holder', Kayhan Ostovar, also from Rocky Mountain College and Director of The Yellowstone River Research Center,

was the data recorder, while Marko supervised the project. One individual was espe-

cially pleased to see the chicks up-close and personal. Ruth Vanderhorst was all smiles, for these where 'her' osprey that she has been observing the last three months for the Yellowstone River Research Center in conjunction with YVAS Osprey Project. She was particularly excited when she was allowed to hold one and I believe this was a moment in her life she will not soon forget. So to all of you 'observers' out there that have so diligently reported on the osprey nesting sites, be proud of what you are doing and thank you very much for all your work. FIELD TRIP NOTES

SATURDAY, MAY 25

POMPEY'S PILLAR

As is customary on YVAS birding trips, the stops on the way can be as rewarding as the intended destination. Our trip leaders, in this case Ruth Vanderhorst, enrich the experience by their knowledge of the best routes and the stops on the way. On this trip a short diversion from the highway led us to a Bald Eagle nest high in a tree with one immature and two fledglings while back on the ground three little fox kits played in the grass. The group identified 60 species on that half -day trip including Wood Duck, Blue-winged Teal, Common Merganser, Great Blue Heron, Upland Sandpiper, Peregrin Falcon, Eastern and Western Kingbirds, Gray Catbird, Ovenbird, Brown Thrasher, Red-eyed and Warbling Vireos, Yellow-breasted Chat, American Redstart, Lazuli and Lark Buntings, White-throated Swift, Bullock's Oriole, Say's Phoebe, Wilson's Snipe, and Pine Siskin. At one point in the day, a flock of The Pillar overlooks the Yellowstone River about 25 miles east of Billings, Montana. The area is easily accessible from Interstate 94, using exit 23, or from State Highway 312. Signs at the site quote from Clark's journals and tell of the Lewis and Clark party's experiences from their entry on the Yellowstone on July 15, 1806, to their encampment at the confluence of Yellowstone and Missouri Rivers on August 3, 1806.

40 or more American White Pelicans put on a truly stunning air show. This Pompey's Pillar trip is one well worth doing over and over for the variety, the setting, and the hope of seeing the American White Pelicans fly once more. Thank you to Nancy Traeger

BIRDATHON 2013

The twenty-four hour competitive fundraiser called Birdathon was held this year on June 1 and 2 and, though only two full time teams and one part time team competed, over \$900. was raised and 131 species were identified in the 24 hour period.

The winning team, The Cravin' Ravens, composed of Mike Weber and Will Crain, reported 114 species. They identified many grassland birds as well as waterfowl and popular song bird species. Mike participated in Birdathon many years ago and his return to this fun and useful activity is welcomed. For Will this was a first time experience. It is likely not his last.

Second place went to the Senior Moments who won in 2012 and 2011. They, Phil McBride, Nancy Traeger and Ruth Vanderhorst, identified 104 species and raised the most donations for YVAS.

Deb and Steve Regele continued to compete while supporting their grandchildren's softball efforts. Birdathon *needs* more teams to solicit donors and compete in this very fun activity. Those of you who enjoy the Christmas Bird Count would find Birdathon a great way spend a day in June. So, start planning now to form a team, identify donors and mark your calendar for the first weekend in June 2014.

SATURDAY, JUNE 22 PRYOR MOUNTAINS

Remember from Kermit the frog's song, "Rainbow Connection?": 'Someday we'll find it, the rainbow connection . . .'? Well, the birders out for this trip surely saw a "rainbow" of birds.

We oohed over the six Sandhill Cranes we saw stepping across a field. We smiled as we drove by the Killdeer family with four little ones, only belly-high to mom, running on their little stick legs. We marveled at the Green-tailed Towhee, calling, in perfect view, from the top of a bush. We delighted in watching the Calliope Hummingbirds feed from feeders located at the ranch on our lunch stop. Broad-tailed Hummingbirds were spotted perched on top of tepee sticks at this same stop. (We could also see an American Robin nested right below an eave of the cabin at this site.)

In one of the wildflower-filled fields, we happily spotted the Lincoln's Sparrow and the White-crowned Sparrow. In the higher elevations of the trip, we delighted in sighting the Mountain Bluebird and four from the woodpecker species, a Northern Flicker, a Hairy Woodpecker, an American Three-toed Woodpecker, and the Williamson's Sapsucker! And back to Kermit's rainbow song: '... we know that it's probably magic ... Well, this trip surely was magic! For a complete list of species sighted, please contact Bernie Mowat. FUN FACTS ABOUT CHICKADEES
 Chickadees are found across much of North America. The more common species include the Black- capped, Carolina and Mountain Chickadees. Have you noticed the following about chickadees in your back- yard?
 Chickadees are easily identified by their namesake call "chick-a-dee."
 They are a favorite feeder bird for many and really enjoy sunflower seeds.
 They are inquisitive and found in wooded areas.
 The Black-capped generally sings out a "fee-bee" call while the Carolina sings "fee-bee fee-bay;" however, this song is learned and, in overlapping territories, may be learned from the "wrong" bird.
 Chickadee's wing beats are about 27 times per second. This compares to a hummingbird's 80 beats per second.
• They are cavity nesters. They will excavate their own nest site in rotten or decaying wood, use an old wood- pecker hole or use a nesting box. (Mountain chickadee may not excavate its own hole and will nest under rock in a bank or in a hole in the ground.) They add a cozy nest on a moss base.
 They usually lay 6-8 white eggs with a light reddish-brown speckling. They hatch in about 12 days and fledge about 21 days later.
 Research has shown that while Chickadees are regular visitors to feeders, only 75 to 80 percent of their food comes from natural sources. However, when the temperature falls below 10 degrees, the survival rate of chickadees almost doubled when they had access to feeders.
 Chickadees are a tough little bird that do not migrate. During cold weather Chickadees have been found to need twenty times more food than they do in summer.
 They like to eat seeds, suet and even coconut; Chickadees weigh less than one-half of an ounce.
