- Talking and educating family and friends about important issues They always say the best place to start is at home and sharing accurate information or correcting false statements is a great place to start.
- Talking to your representatives at local, state, and federal level Push them to "do the right thing" and be sure to thank them when they do Every voice makes a difference.

- Attending BLM Resource Advisory Committee meetings, Resource Management Plan
  comment sessions, and other government meetings These meetings are supported with
  your taxpayer dollars so attend to hear what is being discussed and to share your concerns
  in the public comment period.

  Using the <a href="Committees">Committees</a> Bullet and "drop down menu", select a Committee (e.g. House/Senate Natural Resources, Fish and Game) and input your message; repeat the process and send to numerous Committees!
- Attend public rallies like the recent public lands rally in Helena The capitol rotunda was filled with energy and passion for keeping public lands as "American" lands - It made a difference!
- Writing letters to editor in local newspapers Politician staffs really do read these to keep a pulse on what the public is saying so be sure you are heard.
- Posting on Facebook and other internet venues Let the world know your concerns and issues many people with busy schedules just don't have a clue what is happening and will appreciate your pointing it out.
- Writing an article for YVAS Flyer We all want to learn more so if you have knowledge in special areas, please consider sharing it.
- Running for public office It is a hard job but you will have lots of support!!!

Remember you do not always have to be limited to one topic nor does it always have to be conservation. If you have opinions on sage grouse, public lands, schools and yoga pants, express them all. Keeping expressing them to different venues and with different scenarios so critical topics are not pushed aside, traded, or forgotten.

Birds have wings and use them to fly to environments that allow them to survive and flourish in the different seasons. We have voices and can use them to influence and craft the world around us.
