# **News from our 2015 YVAS Conservation Grant Recipients**

March 21, 2016 Meeting Presentation Summary, 7PM

Jay Sumner and Trinity Pierce were recipients of 2015 YVAS Conservation Grants. Jay Sumner is Executive Director of the Montana Peregrine Institute and Trinity Pierce is the Land Stewardship Coordinator for the Montana Audubon Center. They will present an overview of the important work they do at their respective institutions as well as the results of their efforts with respect to the YVAS Conservation Grant.

Jay will discuss findings of his 2015 field work, his sixteenth year of intensive Peregrine Falcon population studies. The Institute has been in charge of surveying and monitoring Peregrine population populations in collaboration with the MFWP, US Forest Service, USFWS, BLM and all the tribal reservations located in Montana. These studies provide baseline population and reproductive data about the Peregrine Falcon since the species delisting in 1999.

Trinity will showcase her "Living Fences of Urban Shrubbery" project. She will discuss how the planting of certain shrubs provide protective corridors, foraging and nesting locations for many of our native bird species. This project affords people the opportunity to become restorers in their own yards, creating links in a crucial urban habitat corridor.

Contest 1. Bird identification -Judged by George Mowat

This activity will be a bird photograph/picture identification contest. We will have a number of bird photographs. The person entering will submit a list of what birds are in the photo without referring to a bird guide. One entry per person allowed. There will be an adult and a student category.

<u>Contest 2</u>. Bird photography-Judged by Will Crain

This activity is a bird photograph contest with three parts and one award for each category. The bird must be named by species; a common name is fine. If there is more than one bird in the picture you can name them all or one main bird e.g. Mallard drake with friends. A few words about the picture or the bird are optional.

Montana Fish, Wildlife & Parks is planning some exciting field work for this summer. Spring is coming and our avian friends are starting to trickle back to the neighborhood! Montana Fish, Wildlife & Parks will have multiple opportunities to help us learn more about several species this summer. Many of you are familiar with the North American Breeding Bird Survey initiated in 1966 to track the status and trends of North American bird populations. The survey continues to provide a valuable long-term look at avian trends on a large scale. There are several vacant routes that require just one day a year to run and we need expert birders to help! I am currently aware of two routes in our neck of the woods that could use dedicated observers. The first is about 15 miles east of Melville, MT (lat-46.1032917, long-109.6664819) and the second is near St. Xavier, MT south of Hardin (lat-45.4319207, long—1077207419). Observers must have great birding skills and plan on taking the route on for more than one year. Perhaps you have come across Black Rosy-Finches at your backyard feeder over the winter or feeding on the edge of snowfields high in the Beartooths in the summer months. Little is known about the distribution of this species in Montana. During the breeding season they nest in cliffy, alpine areas making them hard to observe. We have not yet put forth efforts to focus specifically on this alpine species. This summer we are planning to take single or multi-day backpacking trips in the Beartooths and numerous mountain ranges in southwest Montana to look for this species. We will likely be following trails and ridges looking for Black Rosy-Finches feeding on and around snowfields. We will need volunteers to help us in this endeavor. We are currently working out the details, but if you are interested in finding out more as we develop our plan email Megan O'Reilly at moreilly@mt.gov or call her at 406-247-2966.

Montana Fish, Wildlife & Parks is interested in increasing our Golden Eagle survey efforts and plans to add some survey flights this spring/summer to try to locate additional territories and check up on some historic territories. We know there are likely some we will miss. If you know of a Golden Eagle nest and are willing to monitor it with any level of effort from once during a season or up to fledging we would love to hear about it and share these data with the Montana Natural Heritage Program. Miles City Eagle Cam A Miles City/ROCKS eagle nest camera became an active internet web site in the spring of 2014. The camera has allowed real time viewing of an active Bald Eagle nest located on the west edge of Miles City Montana. The nest and camera are located on property managed by the Miles City ROCKS (Raising Our Community Kids Safely) Program. The Bald Eagles at this nest have successfully raised young each year since the camera went live as well as for a number of years prior to the installation of the camera.

Together with a number of other entities YVAS was able to support the start up the Bald Eagle nest camera at the ROCKS Program website.

The website is visited for recreational and educational purposes by many Montana viewers as well as by viewers from around the USA and some folks outside the US.

ROCKS had to temporarily disconnect the camera to conduct routine ROCKS business. It will remain down for an undetermined time, but hope is to have it up and active in time for arrival of the Bald Eagles.

The ROCKS Program and Technologies Plus (Miles City Company that installed the camera), as well as the Miles City community are evaluating some new approaches to keep this very popular and valuable website alive. YVAS has offered to assist in that effort if requested and as possible.

## MY BIRD HOUSE EATING RULES:

Identification Card Rules: Chickadees never need to have an identification card to eat because they look exactly like pictures in my bird books. Any bird that really looks like the pictures in my bird books, does not need to have an identification card to eat. All little brown birds that look alike and little gray birds that look alike are required to show identity cards before eating. All birds that do not look like pictures in my bird books are required to have identification cards for eating. Birds that failed to get their pictures in my bird books must show identification cards to get to eat.

Eating Order Rules: Any rarely seen bird that rarely comes gets to eat first. Chickadees eat second being the most loyal birds to come. Little brown birds eat third because they will eat cornmeal. Little gray birds eat fourth because they're not that loyal to come.

Other Eating Rules: Birds must eat all the time because I do not think the birds otherwise eat all 25 pounds of bird food I purchased for birds. Due to safety considerations, only one bird should eat at a time. I can't have birds falling out of my bird feeder. Birds need to find a stray dog to live with us. This might be needed because my neighbor's cat might not be as stupid as it looks. By David Omen, Member
