Wednesday, January 1 Yellowtail Afterbay

The new year started off with fairly mild temperatures and no snow on the ground. Unfortunately, it was very windy! Still, the scenery was nice, the roads were clear, and the wind ain't so bad inside the car... So nine birders started the year off right. Bald Eagles, Rough-legged and Red-tail Hawks kept us company along the way with an American Kestrel and an out-of-place Ferruginous Hawk as a bonus.

As we arrived at the Afterbay we could see waves with whitecaps and were reminded birding there was going to be tough. Barb Pitman played with a handheld anemometer and measured nearly 30 mph winds – pretty much as forecast! And the Afterbay did in fact have fewer species of ducks and geese than we had hoped and at times it seemed like we might have been at the coast, watching the ducks rise and fall on the waves. Still, there were lots of Mallards, Canada Geese and Common Goldeneye plus with quite a few American Wigeon, but only a few Gadwalls, Ring-necked Ducks,

and Cackling Geese and no surprise guests. We tried really hard to find a Barrow's Goldeneye and maybe sorta kinda, I dunno...

By far, most of the geese we saw were out in the fields along Hwy 313 rather than at the Afterbay. Maybe some of the missing ducks were still out and about as well. In fact, Bird-of-the-Day was out there, too – one little white goose was discovered early in the day amongst a flock of Canada Geese. Even with our spotting scopes shaking in the wind we were able to enjoy this little Ross's Goose which carried us through the day! Twenty-Nine years ago Yellowstone River Parks Association (YRPA) was founded on the idea that Billings needed to pay more attention to two principal physical features: the Yellowstone River and the Rims. YRPA realized that access to the recreation along the Yellowstone was vital to our community's way of life.

In the past three decades YRPA has developed and maintained:


- Joel's Pond an 8 acre park with 12 acres of pond near Shiloh Road;
- The new 15-acre Blue Creek fishing/Boat Access in partnership with the Montana Departments of Justice and Fish Wildlife and Parks;
- The Montana Audubon Education Center;
- Norm's Island, associated trails and two new vaulted bathrooms at the parking area.
- The caretaker facility at USDI BLM Four Dances Recreational site which was built by YRPA. YRPA continues to pay the caretakers wages a great example of partnership with the BLM.

YRPA volunteers continue to maintain Two Moon Park even though the park is owned by

Yellowstone County. One of their greatest accomplishments is John H. Dover Memorial Park and its 145 acres of Five Mile Creek bottom fronting along the Yellowstone River. This spectacular park provides vistas, unique bridges, picnic shelters and bathrooms.

All of these accomplishments were because of a vision, work

by volunteers, and donations. YRPA has no paid employees and has spent millions of dollars in developing theses treasures for future generations.
