Shooting of Piscivorous Birds at the Miles City Hatchery

In late summer 2020, Yellowstone Valley Audubon Society (YVAS) learned that the MT Fish, Wildlife and Parks (MFWP) Hatchery in Miles City had been applying for and receiving Federal Migratory Bird Depredation Permits to shoot Ospreys and other piscivorous birds. From 2018 to 2020, 8 Ospreys, 105 Canada Geese, 26 Great Blue Herons, and 16 Double-Crested Cormorants have been shot.

The Miles City Hatchery's 2021 Depredation Permit Application requests authority to shoot up to 4 Ospreys, 15 Double-crested Cormorants, 15 Great Blue Herons, 50 Canada Geese, and new this year, 5 Belted Kingfishers. The US Fish Wildlife Service (USFWS) regulates (issues or denies) the Depredation Permits.

According to MFWP, Ospreys were eating too many of the hatchery fish, specifically largemouth bass, which

are an introduced species in Montana. YVAS was told that the number of bass taken by Ospreys was an unacceptable operational and financial loss for the hatchery. The hatchery shot two Ospreys in 2018, five in 2019, and one in 2020.



Miles City is the eastern extent of breeding Ospreys on the Yellowstone River. Data submitted by the Miles City nest monitors shows that the number of fledglings from known nests within a 20-mile radius has declined drastically over the last three years. In fact, no fledglings were produced in 2018, 2019, and 2020. This decline did not go unnoticed by the local Osprey nest monitors, who began expressing concerns through their posts to the Osprey Google Group in 2019. YVAS learned in August 2020 that Montana-Dakota Utilities reluctantly removed the nesting platforms adjacent to the hatchery at the request of MFWP.

The killing of native wildlife to support an introduced fishery in Montana goes against YVAS philosophy, sound science, and management for good ecological integrity.

> This deadly bird management and permitting situation at the Miles City Hatchery is upsetting, inappropriate, and unacceptable to many of us.

YVAS and National Audubon Society representatives are in discussions with USFWS and MFWP to find alternative non-lethal solutions to this conflict although there have been no significant cooperation or results from the agencies since September 2020 when the discussions began.

Sign Yellowstone Valley Audubon

Society/National Audubon Society's Petition to stop the shooting of native birds at the expense of nonnative fish species at the Miles City Hatchery. More progressive and nonlethal solutions are available. They need to be studied and implemented.

Miles City Bald Eagle Nest Camera

The Bald Eagles are busy at the Miles City nest and the camera is on line and live to prove it!

The camera was installed in February 2014 and the May 2014 Flyer p. 6 announced that the camera was officially "on line" (https://yvaudubon.org/wp-content/uploads/2015/07/ MAY2014R.pdf)

The following excerpt from that 2014 announcement is as relevant today as it was then:

"The nest is approximately eight feet wide and sits ninety eight feet high housed in a cottonwood tree. It has been used consecutively (... since 2009...) by nesting pairs. The eagles are currently on the nest... "We have already learned so much from this opportunity," said Brad Schmitz, Fish Wildlife and Parks, Region 7 Supervisor, "Not only about this pair of eagles in particular, but also this technology that may be used in future projects." FWP expects the resident Bald Eagles have an enormous amount of information to share with the community. This project has ... truly been a community project.... Immediately after beginning to pursue the idea, support and offers to help came out of the woodwork"..."

- Yellowstone Valley Audubon- Conservation Grant was written by FWP on behalf of ROCKS and YVAS awarded \$1000.00 to the ROCKS program to be used towards the purchase of the camera and for some project costs.
- ROCKS Program- Approval to tap into power and house the modem. ROCKS has ownership of the camera and allows the camera system to use ROCKS digital access.
- Technologies Plus- Dean Hanvold donated labor and expertise for camera purchase, installation and maintenance.
- Montana Fish, Wildlife and Parks, Region 7- Initial project management, staff time and small local, one time purchases.
- Kiwi Pete's Tree Service- Donating the bucket truck and labor on Installation Date - Truck was 15 feet short on attempted install date of 2/17/14 so...
- Miles City Fire Department completed the camera installation.
- City of Miles City- Permission to install the camera on City property.
- Montana Dept. of Transportation- Traffic Control on Installation day

The camera has been 'down' only infrequently and is routinely up and running, as it is now: <u>https://</u>53431558b81c6.click2stream.com/



That 2014 camera is getting old by 'outdoor-4-seasons-in-MT' camera standards, and technology has advanced quite a bit since 2014. YVAS and Technologies Plus of Miles City are discussing possibilities for upgrading that camera to a new generation 'Pan Tilt Zoom Camera'. Such a camera would allow adjusting camera angle and zoom from a remote location, and would extend nest viewing life and options.

The Miles City ROCKS (Raising Our Community Kids Safely) Program says it regularly uses the camera set up for educational programs in Miles City and surrounding areas - the kids and families really enjoy it and learn from it.

YVAS and Technologies Plus, Miles City receive notes from viewers - some from outside the USA - that enjoy the web site and the viewing of real-time Bald Eagle nest activity in Montana.
