Midwinter Waterfowl Survey

I did "my" part of the Midwinter Waterfowl Survey on January 4, 2021. For this coordinated survey during the week designated by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, all states across the country are counting ducks and geese. By doing it the same week, it minimizes the chance

the same week, it minimizes the charce that birds are missed or counted twice. This survey is especially useful for Canada geese, as it provides an annual estimate of the population. For my part, I fly with our pilot in a Piper Supercub along the Yellowstone River from Billings to Miles City, plus the Bighorn River. It's a sunrise to sunset



survey, which gets a bit tiring, with my long legs and stiff knees crammed into a small plane for that length of time. This is the 30th year that I have done the survey, the last 11 with the same pilot.

We leave the FWP hanger near the airport just before sunrise so we can find geese still on the river, where they are easier to find and count. This day we got to Forsyth before the geese started flying off the river, after which we needed to find them


March Events at the Montana Audubon Center

We are taking the following precautions to protect everyone's health and safety. Our adult programs are held entirely outdoors or online. Masks are required for all inperson programs, and social distancing between participants will be maintained. Please stay home if you feel sick or have a fever.

Owl Prowl: Saturday March 6 from 4 - 5:30

Come learn all about owls and the amazing adaptations that allow them to be skilled hunters and denizens of the night. We'll talk about the different species of owls that live in the area, and go for a hike to look and listen for them. Please bring a mask and a flashlight. Suggested donation \$5/ members, \$10/non-member, and free for children under 12 in the fields. For the Bighorn River later in the day, just about all of the geese were in fields feeding. There were a lot of geese this time, a new record, in fact! I ended up with an estimate of 91,380. Added to geese counted by other FWP staff downstream from Miles City and below Fort Peck Dam, the total came to just over 250,000, also a new record.



they migrate that late to Colorado, or would they stick around after their food was covered with snow? I think some did migrate, but I believe most sat next to the river, conserving heat and energy. They carried a lot of fat going into the severe cold spell, and they can survive without eating for a while. I was relieved when the recent warm spell melted the snow, and food was again available for them.

Get Your COVID Vaccination and Let's Go Birding!

Since many of our members fit in Category 1B for the COVID vaccination, I urge those of you who qualify, to pursue an appointment for a vaccination. This is taken directly from the 2/19/21 Billings Gazette:

"Appointments for the second week of the free Yellowstone County community COVID-19 vaccination clinic at Cedar Hall at MetraPark are now available online.

To schedule a COVID-19 vaccination appointment, go to mtreadyclinic.org and click on the blue button that says: Find a clinic. Scrolling down, there is information on each of next week's clinics scheduled at Cedar Hall. If the clinics are not listed, type "Metra" into the location search. Using an internet browser like Google Chrome or Firefox to access the appointments is best.

The online form has space for insurance information, which there is no need to complete. All COVID-19 vaccinations given at Cedar Hall are free of charge and no insurance is required.

Beginning at 9 a.m. on Monday, Feb. 22, appointments for the week's clinics also will be available by calling 406-651-6596. Appointment times are being saved for people without the ability to schedule an appointment online.

Appointments are available to Yellowstone County residents who meet Montana's criteria for the 1A or 1B priority group. This includes health care workers, first responders, people age 70 or older, people age 16 to 69 with a serious health condition that puts them at high risk of severe COVID-19 illness, Native Americans and other people of color who may be at higher risk for severe COVID-19 illness."

Keep in mind that after vaccination you could still pass the virus to someone else, so COVID protocols will still be in order, but you will have the satisfaction that you did your part to make your world a safer place!
