# The Yellowstone River Osprey Project: A Volunteer Effort!

In 2009 a few members of Yellowstone Valley Audubon initiated a field study of Ospreys. They were interested in monitoring the distribution and abundance of the local population, and in helping management agencies and electric utilities reduce human-Osprey conflicts. That first year 3 members found 22 nests. Today over 40 volunteers monitor nearly 100 nests from Gardiner to Miles City in collaboration with power companies, landowners, and government agencies. This presentation will describe how nest monitors are trained to become proficient in Osprey observation and data collection. From the efforts of these dedicated volunteers, you will learn where Ospreys produced along the Yellowstone River migrate and spend the winter, how long they live, where they settle to breed, and their lifetime reproductive success. You will also learn how many electrocutions and twine entanglements occur each year, and the management to reduce these mortality factors. The Osprey population along the Yellowstone River continues to increase and the project is in need of additional volunteers. If you are curious about science, have some spare time each week during spring and summer, and might like to become an Osprey nest monitor, please consider attending this presentation.

Marco Restani coordinates the research component of the YVAS Osprey Nest Monitoring Project. He is a Biologist at NorthWestern Energy where he leads the company's Avian Protection Program. Prior to returning to Montana, he was Professor of Wildlife Ecology at St. Cloud State University in Minnesota.



### An Incomplete Summary of Billings Christmas Bird Count

Like election night, not all the returns are in yet for the December 17 Audubon Christmas Bird Count. With 93% of the results in, we have 53 species. There were 33 field birdwatchers, and 16 feeder watchers, one a newborn's Mom. We started out with a sunny, 20 F morning with a 10-mph wind, and progressed to a sunny, calm, 30 F afternoon.

The following species were seen by only 1 or 2 groups, usually in small numbers. Bufflehead, Hooded Merganser, Wild Turkey, Double Crested Cormorant, Great Blue Heron, Cooper's Hawk, Ferruginous Hawk, American Kestral, Merlin, Virginia Rail, Mourning Dove, Belted Kingfisher, Hairy Woodpecker, Yellow Shafted Flicker, Northern Shrike, Pinyon Jay (46), Pygmy Nuthatch (8), Bohemian Waxwing (50), American Tree Sparrow, White Winged Junco, and Song Sparrow.

Half of these species are not difficult to identify, you just need to be in the right place at the right time. So reserve Saturday, December 16, 2023, for the next CBC. The more birdwatchers, the more right time/right place times we can have.

Joining me were Stan Heath, Susan Hovde, Raylene Wall, and Mike Lesnik. We saw very few hawks on the day but did enjoy quite a few eagles and over 30 species total.
