# Safe Passages for Wildlife with Blakeley Adkins

Blakeley Adkins resides in Livingston and works for the Greater Yellowstone Coalition. After 15 years of working as a wildlife technician across North America and as a grizzly bear viewing guide in British Columbia, her current role is focused on grizzly bear conflict mitigation as well as promoting wildlife crossings throughout the Greater Yellowstone Ecosystem. Blakeley is a member of the statewide partnership *Montanans for Safe Wildlife Passage* as well as the locally led group *Yellowstone Safe Passages*, both of which are working with agency partners and community members to reduce vehicle accidents involving wildlife.

Recent data from State Farm Insurance states that 5% of all vehicle accidents nationwide involve wildlife. In Montana that number jumps to 10%, and in places like HWY 89 in the Upper Yellowstone Watershed, 50% of all reported accidents involve wildlife. Vehicle-wildlife collisions have detrimental impacts on human safety, incur a huge economic cost, and greatly influence wildlife conservation.

Join us at 7 PM on Monday, November 20th, when Blakeley will discuss this topic in depth including solutions, challenges, and what we can all do to help.

## News from the YVAS Board

On behalf of YVAS, the Board of Directors has signed on to Yellowstone River Parks Association's letter addressed to the Montana Department of Environmental Quality and all Incident Command teams that responded to the Montana Rail Link derailment at Reed Point on June 24, 2023. These teams include Montana Fish, Wildlife and Parks, U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, Montana Rail Link, and Stillwater County Disaster and Emergency Services.

Nine other local and state environmental and outdoor recreation businesses and organizations, and concerned citizens, have signed the letter.

The YRPA letter requests that public information sessions be held to address the 440,000 pounds of molten asphalt that spilled into the river including question and answer sessions. Up to now, there has been a lack of transparency and limited information provided to the public about this disaster.

# 2023 Billings Christmas Bird Count

All Volunteers Welcome - Please Sign Up!

Save **Saturday, December 16, 2023**, on your calendar for the Billings 2023 Christmas Bird Count (CBC).

The CBC is a long-term citizen science survey started in 1900 by National Audubon, and probably conducted in Billings for the first time about 1940. Every count area is a circle of 7.5 mile radius. Ours is centered on the Billings Exxon Refinery. The extent of the circle area reaches the Huntley bridge across the Yellowstone River on HWY 312, six miles north of HWY 312 on HWY 87 N, the east edge of Zimmerman Park, Rehberg and Grand, King Ave West and South 24th St West, ¼ mile West of Norm's Island, Blue Creek Road at Briarwood Golf Club, HWY 87 S at Pryor Road, I-90 at Pryor Creek Road, and back to Huntley, including Lockwood, Billings Heights, and the close-in part of West Billings.

This year we will meet for breakfast (optional) from 7:00 – 8:00am at Perkins, 825 N 27th St, and will convene again about 5:00 pm at the Montana Audubon Center, 7026 S Billings Blvd, to compile the species observed, and to enjoy free food provided by YVAS.

Each participant will be assigned to an area with specific boundaries by the count organizer/compiler. Maps and recording sheets will be distributed at breakfast or in advance to a group leader for each area. Please return the results of the count to the Montana Audubon Center around 5:00pm on count day or to the compiler as soon as possible afterward.

Feeder watchers are also needed on count day,
December 16. Birders living in the count circle can tally
and report the species and numbers of birds they see at
their feeders and/or from their home. You may be the
lucky one to add a species to the count total. More
feeder watchers would be welcome.

Please contact one of the count organizers well before December 16. Let them know you want to help.

## How 'Bout Them Bluebirds?

Each year, right around the beginning of April, the Mountain Bluebirds return to the high lands surrounding Billings: Emerald Hills in Lockwood, the Acton BLM, and my favorite place - PHIPPS PARK.

So why Phipps? Because Phipps has everything a bluebird could ever want. Open fields. Bushes. Trees. Insects. And

13 Bluebird Boxes with holes just the right size, facing just the right direction (east), and fitted with predator guards to keep out the snakes and mice.

Each year, dedicated YVAS members are ready and waiting for them at Phipps Park, with binoculars, cameras, screwdriver, cell phones, pen, and notebook at the ready.

What do they do with all that equipment? Using their binoculars, they scan the area in the vicinity of each box looking for Mountain Bluebirds, of course. When the way is clear, they use the screwdriver to loosen one screw on the front of the box and carefully drop the front down two inches – just enough to insert a cell phone and quickly photograph the contents of the box. Then the front slides back up, the screw is tightened, and the monitors quickly back off before stopping to record the contents of the box.

Is the box empty? Is there a nest in progress? Are there eggs,

nestlings, or even an adult bird sitting on the nest? What bird made that nest? Hopefully, it is the small, tidy nest of a Mountain Bluebird, perhaps filled with 4-6 blue eggs. But often it is a large, messy nest filled with the distinctive big blue feathers and white eggs of the tree swallow. Repeat once a week for three months or until the nests are empty, nestlings fledged, and the nest monitors are in shape.

Then comes the year's summary: How did 2023 stack up?

2023 was the best year for Mountain Bluebirds at Phipps Park in the last five years. Bluebirds occupied 7 of the thirteen nest boxes producing 29 fledglings! Compare this with just ONE occupied box in 2019, and all six nestlings from that box perished. The three years in between produced, in order, 5 fledglings in 2020; 16 in 2021; 18 in 2022!

So How 'Bout Them Bluebirds? Can they make the Series again in 2024?

## Owl Tell You Five Fun Facts About the Owl

- Owls belong to either the "Typical or True" owl family (Strigidae) or the "Barn Owl" family (Tytonidae). Typical owls have facial feathers that form a round pattern. The facial feathers of Barn Owls form a heart shape.
- Owls have long, tube-shaped eyeballs. They cannot roll their eyes and must turn their heads in order to see in different directions.
- Eye color indicates when an owl hunts. Owls with dark brown or black eyes are nocturnal and prefer to hunt at night. The dark eye color is evolutionary to help camouflage them in the darkness. Owls with orange eyes are crepuscular, meaning they're active during low light periods such as dusk and dawn. Yellow-eyed owls are diurnal and hunt during the day.
- Owls can get divorced. About 25% of Barn Owls divorce, but only when breeding isn't going well. When owls separate, the female leaves to find a more compatible (not better looking) mate. (She gets the "jeep" and he gets the "palace.")

There are 18 species of owls in United States. Only the Spotted Owl, Hawk Owl, Elf Owl, and Ferruginous Pygmy

Owl cannot be found in Montana.


